This 1 story square rood frame residence has a gentle pitched gable roof with a gable roof enclosed front porch and a gable roof back addition. Other features include: wood shingle roof with 2 interior chimneys, both stretcher bond brick with corbeled caps; exposed rafters; gable 1/1 double hung windows; very extended eaves, with wood collar beam; king post and diagonal supports; diagonal wood braces with purlins; 6/6 double hung windows with drip board and extended sills; fixed, louvered shutters beside the first floor windows; and horizontal wood overlap siding. The enclosed front porch has molded wood corner posts, wood gable decoration of collar beam, king post and diagonal supports, solid wood panel rails, with lattice work under the porch. The porch is screened. There is a rusticated cement block foundation. The rear gable addition was added later.

This is a contributing structure.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE: Justify how the persons, important events, and/or historical patterns associated with the structure/site and surrounding area lend the property significance.

This structure was the residence of Dr. Guy E. O'Neil, one of the first dentists in Roundup, who had his practice at 119 Main Street for several years. He owned this property from 1912 to 1919.
