

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION: Describe present appearance of structure/site, then contrast and compare that with it's original appearance, noting additions, alterations, and changes in materials. Discuss significant architectural features.

This one-story, rectangular wood-frame residence has a gable roof, open-gable, one-half front porch, and a large gable addition to the rear. Other features include a wood shingle roof, stretcher bond enterior brick chimney, a large round metal stovepipe, aluminum frame rectangular slide wind windows, wide aluminum siding, a wide enclosed eaves overhang, and a modern wood door with aluminum storm door. The open porch is gabled with the wide enclosed eaves and boxed partial gable return. There is a carved wood pieced arch in the gable face. Two plain metal posts are the morch supports. The porch is a concrete block with wrought iron railing. There is a stretcher bond brick flower bed with header bond cap around the front and sides. To the rear is a fiberglass patio with large plate glass window with side lights. The new door is a modern multilight in diamond pattern wood door.

There is a storage shed and garage which is a rectangular wood-frame structure, with gable roof, wood shingles, plain wood siding with corner boards, a pipe chimney and an attached shed roof addition with wood garage doors and vertical wood siding. A significant architectural feature is the unusual curved wood arch over the front porch. Originally it was over the small entry stoop, but when a full cement porch was added, the arch was moved.

This is a neutral structure.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE: Justify how the persons, important events, and/or historical patterns associated with the structure/site and surrounding area lend the property significance.

Gilbert Gottfrey was a carpenter in Roundup, 1910. He worked for J.W. Grant, 1912-1917. He was Sheriff of Musselshell County in 1918, and President of the Roundup Milling Company. He owned this property from 1918 to 1920.
